After they had gone a long time without food, Paul stood up before them and said: "Men, you should have taken my advice not to sail from Crete; then you would have spared yourselves this damage and loss Acts 27:21(NIV)

But now I urge you to keep up your courage, because not one of you will be lost; only the ship will be destroyed.<sup>23</sup>Last night an angel of the God to whom I belong and whom I serve stood beside me<sup>24</sup> and said, 'Do not be afraid, Paul. You must stand trial before Caesar; and God has graciously given you the lives of all who sail with you.' <sup>25</sup> So keep up your courage, men, for <u>I have faith in God</u> that it will happen just as he told me.<sup>26</sup>Nevertheless, we must run aground on some island." ... <sup>33</sup> "For the last fourteen days," he said, "you have been in constant suspense and have gone without food you haven't eaten anything.<sup>34</sup>Now I urge you to take some food. You need it to survive. Not one of you will lose a single hair from his head." 35 After he said this, he took some bread and gave thanks to God in front of them all. Then he broke it and began to eat. <sup>36</sup> They were all encouraged and ate some food themselves. <sup>37</sup> Altogether there were 276 of us on board. <sup>38</sup> When they had eaten as much as they wanted, they lightened the ship by throwing the *arain into the sea.* **Acts 27:22-25** (NIV)

## 3. FAITHFUL FRIENDS ENABLE AND

That night the Master appeared to Paul: "It's going to be all right. Everything is going to turn out for the best. You've been a good witness for me here in Jerusalem. Now you're going to be my witness in Rome!" Acts 23:12 (MP)

Next day the Jews worked up a plot against Paul .... <sup>16</sup> Paul's nephew, his sister's son, overheard them plotting the ambush. He went immediately to the barracks and told Paul. Acts 23:13, 16 (MP)

As soon as it was decided that we should sail away to Italy, Paul and some other prisoners were put in charge of a centurion named Julius, of the emperor's own regiment. We embarked on a ship hailing from Adramyttium, bound for the Asian ports, and set sail. Among our company was Aristarchus, a Macedonian from Thessalonica. Acts 27:1 Phillips

...when we arrived in Macedonia, our bodies had no ease or rest, but we were oppressed in every way and afflicted at every turn-fighting and contentions without, dread and fears within. <sup>6</sup> But God, Who comforts and encourages and refreshes and cheers the depressed and the sinking, comforted and encouraged and refreshed and cheered us by the arrival of Titus. 2 Corinthians 7:5, 6 (AMPC)

So Joshua and his men went out to fight the army of Amalek. Meanwhile Moses, Aaron, and Hur went to the top of the hill. <sup>11</sup>And as long as Moses held up the rod in his hands, Israel was winning; but whenever he rested his arms at his sides, the soldiers of Amalek were winning. <sup>12</sup> Moses' arms finally became too tired to hold up the rod any longer; so Aaron and Hur rolled a stone for him to sit on, and they stood on each side, holding up his hands until sunset.<sup>13</sup> As a result, Joshua and his troops crushed the army of Amalek, putting them to the sword. **Exodus 17:10-13** (TLB)
